First Quarter in Review:

Even though the museum may be closed for the season, the Board has been busy preparing for the summer. There a few fun events in the works and some work has been done inside of the Museum. Everyone is looking forward to the warm summer weather and for the museum to be open again.

Last year we participated in a Museum Assessment Program through the American Alliance of Museums. This year we have been lucky enough to be selected to participate in another one. Last year we had an Organizational Assessment which focused on all aspects of our museum and historical society operations. It helped us evaluate the ways in which the museum has been operated for the past several years and taught us how to move forward following museum standards and best practices. The Organizational Assessment helped us understand the value of strategic plans and how to plan with both long term and short term goals in mind.

The Assessment we are participating in this year is the Collection Stewardship Assessment. The process of the assessment is generally the same as the Organizational Assessment. First we had to fill out a detailed application and be accepted into the program. We are now in the self-study workbook stage of the assessment, during this stage an assessment team made up of staff and board members work on a very in-depth workbook and two activities. Both the workbook and the self-study activities are aimed to make us take an intensive look into how we are managing our collections and our policies related to collections management. We have already learned a lot and are learning that we have room to grow as we continue to care for our collections.

This summer, after we have our workbook and activities completed, we will have a visit from our peer reviewer, Beth Hansen, who comes from a group of accredited volunteers with the American Alliance of Museums who have experience and knowledge in museums like ours. Beth will visit our museum this summer and will write a review with recommendations on how we can move forward in a way that is in the best interest or our collections and our mission as a museum.

These assessments are great opportunities for staff and board members to learn about the best way in which to care for the museum and the collections housed within. Participation in these assessments shows a real commitment on the part of board and staff members to the future of our museum.

There have been some projects going on inside the museum this winter as well. One that we are all very excited about is the uncovering of the Judge's desk upstairs in the courtroom. A few hard-working board members took the time to remove the paneling that was covering up the beautiful desk. As it continues to warm up the restoration will be complete. Some windows throughout the building have received an upgrade of window-coverings. Many of the windows were previously covered by Styrofoam sheets, as natural light can be harmful to items on display, but are now covered with insulated panels with a crisp white finish. These panels look much nicer and are a lot more durable and sturdy than the Styrofoam.
